Hospital stay	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Semi private room • meals • general nursing • drugs as part of your inpatient treatment • other hospital services and supplies 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$1,068 deductible for the first 60 days • \$267 per day for days 61-90 • \$534 per day after that (until all "lifetime reserve days" are used**)
	<p>This doesn't include private-duty nursing, a television or telephone in your room, or personal care items like razors or slipper socks. The doctor services you get while you are in a hospital are covered under Part B.</p>	
Nursing home care	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • semi-private room • meals • skilled nursing and rehabilitative services other services and supplies 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$0 for the first 20 days • \$133.50 per day four days 21-100 • All costs after that
	<p>Medicare doesn't cover long-term care or custodial care in this setting.</p>	
Hospice Care	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • drugs (for pain relief and symptom management) • medical, nursing, social services • other covered services as well as services not usually covered by Medicare (like grief counseling) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$0 for hospice care • A copayment of up to \$5 per prescription for outpatient prescription drugs for pain and symptom management • 5% of the Medicare-approved amount for inpatient respite care
	<p>Hospice care is usually given in your home (or a nursing home). Medicare covers some short-term inpatient stays (for pain and symptom management that requires an inpatient stay) in a Medicare-approved facility, such as a hospice facility, hospital, or skilled nursing facility.</p>	
	<p>Medicare also covers inpatient respite care (care given to a hospice patient so that the usual caregiver can rest). You can stay in a Medicare-approved facility up to 5 days each time you get respite care. Medicare may pay for covered services for health problems that aren't related to your terminal illness.</p>	
Home Health Services	<p>You can only get home health services following a hospital stay.</p> <p>Medically necessary, part-time or intermittent skilled nursing care, physical therapy, speech language pathology, or a continuing need for occupational therapy. Care must be ordered by a doctor.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$0 for home health services for the first 100 visits following a hospital stay • 20% of all durable medical equipment
	<p>Home health services may also include medical social services, part-time or intermittent home health aide services, durable medical equipment and medical supplies for use at home.</p>

** These are additional days that Medicare will pay for when you are in a hospital for more than 90 days. You have a total of 60 reserve days that can be used during your lifetime. For each lifetime reserve day, Medicare pays all covered costs except for a daily coinsurance - \$534
